

“JESUS, I TRUST IN YOU”



Devotion to the Divine Mercy was promoted by Sister Faustina Kowalska, canonized on April 30, 2000. Pope St. John Paul chose that day to announce that, "Throughout the world, the Second Sunday of Easter will be given the name Divine Mercy Sunday." The essential and fundamental characteristic of devotion to the Divine Mercy is trust in Jesus. "Mercy," said Pope John Paul, "is an indispensable dimension of love; it is, as it were, love's second name and, at the same time, the specific manner in which love is revealed and effected vis-à-vis the reality of the evil that is in the world, affecting and besieging man, insinuating itself even into his heart." In the face of all the manifestations of physical and moral evil, before all the threats that cloud the whole horizon of the life of humanity today, the Church—professing mercy and remaining always faithful to it—has the right and the duty to call upon the mercy of God. Let us ... boldly proclaim that "God is rich in mercy; because of his great love for us, he brought us to life with Christ when we were dead in sin" (Eph 2:4-5). May Mary, Mother of the Crucified and Risen One and our most merciful Mother too, "continue by her manifold intercession to obtain for us the graces of eternal salvation" (Lumen Gentium, 62).

HOW TO SAY THE CHAPLET OF MERCY:

This chaplet only takes a few minutes to say, on ordinary rosary beads.

First, say one "Our Father," one "Hail Mary," and one "Apostles' Creed."

Then, on the large beads of the rosary, say the prayer:

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, of your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ . . .

Rin atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

On each of the ten small beads, pray:

For the sake of His Sorrowful Passion . . .

Rhave mercy on us and on the whole world.

After reciting all five decades this way, end by repeating, three times:

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One:

Rhave mercy on us and on the whole world.



HERE'S A QUESTION

Concerning the line in the Apostles' Creed that reads, "He will come again to judge the living and the dead," what about the judgment we experience at death?

The Church teaches, as an article of faith, that the souls of those who die go immediately to heaven, purgatory or hell. This is called the "particular judgment," and it is one of the theological conclusions to be drawn from Jesus' words on Good Friday, when he assures the thief, "Today you will be with me in paradise." Our creed also professes faith in Christ's coming at the end of time, "to judge the living and the dead." The Church identifies this as the "general judgment," which will decide the fate of those who are yet to die, and confirm the judgment of those who have already died. Obviously, we must leave the details of this event to God. However, faith assures us our bodies will rise on the last day, to be reunited with our souls, and to share our souls' eternal reward. The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes Jesus' "following in the steps of the prophets and John the Baptist," and says that on the Last Day "will the conduct of each one and the secrets of hearts be brought to light" (see No. 678). Unlike the privacy of the particular judgment, this judgment will manifest Christ's glory to all creation.

“HAIL MARY, FULL OF GRACE”



Feast of the Annunciation normally fall on March 25 (the date calculated backwards from the Nativity (Christmas.) This year, because of conflicts of dates with Palm Sunday and Holy Week, the Church celebrates the feast on Monday, April 9 (join us for Mass at 8:30 am). It commemorates two events important to all humanity. On this day, the Archangel Gabriel appeared to Mary to announce that she was to be the Mother of the Redeemer and Messiah promised for centuries. On the same day, the Incarnation took place: God the Son, the second person of the Trinity, assumed a human body and soul and became the Son of Mary and

Joseph. Sometimes one action of one person changes life for everyone. Adam and Eve deciding to disobey God is one example, bringing Original Sin into the world. The Annunciation is another very important example. 'Annunciation' sounds like announcement, and that's what happened. An angel appeared to Mary and 'announced' that she had found favour with God and would bear a son, Jesus, Son of the Most High. Mary answered, "Fiat" ('Let it be done to me according to Thy Word'). One simple action of saying 'Yes' to God changed everything. Mary became the Mother of God, and Our Blessed Mother. Jesus grew up in Nazareth, taught his disciples and died on the Cross for all our sins. The Feast of the Annunciation is an opportunity to bow our heads and thank Our Blessed Mother for her faith and trust, and to offer our own trusting 'Fiat' to God's plan for us. www.domestic-church.com
